Dear Parents and Guardians.

To say that things have been very busy from my end, from the last time I have written you, is an understatement. Happily though, it has been busy and wonderful! I have several highlights that I am excited to share with you.

At the top of my list is the Honors Parents' Breakfast that was held on March 16th. Judging from the energy of the most distinguished crowd that packed Elan that day, and the pictures that found their way onto many Facebook pages and other social media, it was an event that truly made a lot of us proud. It was another celebration of teamwork, this time between loving and supportive parents and their daughters who are inspired and determined to give their education pursuits their very best.

The time that I spent with ten of our brightest young 'Belles' (yes, they could easily be Disney princesses!) at the Walt Disney World Youth Education Series in Orlando from March 6th to the 9th, was both pleasurable and rewarding. Our girls were the epitome of *elan*. While they exuded energy, enthusiasm, and confidence, they were likewise respectful and humble. I would intently listen in on conversations they had with our program facilitators, with people while on bus rides and at the airport, and amongst themselves, and be amazed with the pep and wisdom that punctuated these interactions. On February 27th, the entire school was treated to *a Shakespeare Live* rendition of *Julius Caesar*. It was a delight watching our students take in the flare and flavor of the great writer and pre-eminent dramatist that is Shakespeare.

You will always hear me say that "The sisterhood at SDA is real". On February 22nd, **Cheryl Higgins Wong** '95, SDA alumna and owner of Titan Engineers PC in Union NJ, invited our 8th and 10th grade STEM students to a workshop at Titan where, together with her husband Nicholas Wong SPP '94, our young ladies interacted with real-life engineers at work. They came back to school impressed and inspired to seriously consider careers in the field which is, essentially, one of the major goals of all STEM programs, that is, to encourage more women to be part of this largely male-dominated world.

Another SDA alumna, **Jennifer Valdora Baker '01**, a teacher at PS 23 (MarcAnthony DiNardo School) has, for a number of years now, invited her younger SDA sisters to be part of Read Across America, an annual reading motivation and awareness program that calls for every child in every community to celebrate reading on March 2nd, the birthday of beloved children's author Dr. Seuss. On this day this year, two Senior classes, along with Ms. Arguelles and myself, walked down Duncan Avenue to read to PS 23's pre-Kindergarteners to 3rd graders. I had a blast going from one classroom to another watching our young ladies (and Ms. Arguelles!) reading and having fun at Circle Time with their particularly bright-eyed audience.

During their English classes on March 9th, our 10th graders took turns sitting down with our "Poet for a Day" Naomi Extra, a freelance writer, poet, and doctoral student in American Studies at Rutgers University-Newark. The winners of our just-concluded Poetry Contest enjoyed lunch that day with Naomi who, in both her creative and scholarly work, explores the themes of agency and pleasure in the lives of black women and girls.

On March 13th, twelve of our young scientists/researchers made their annual trek to the Jersey City Medical Center/Barnabas Health STEM Challenge (formerly the Hudson County Science Fair) held at the Liberty Science Center where they presented their projects which included models for patellar strain, Faraday cages, studies on biogas, geothermal energy, diabetic cats, among others.

And let me not forget to thank you for the Teacher Appreciation Breakfast that was so thoughtfully prepared for us on February 3rd by the Parent Council. It was an excellent start to our day!

As I mentioned earlier, these are just highlights. We have seen quite a number of firsts this far into the school year and we are pretty proud of what we have accomplished. Kudos to you, parents, for the support and encouragement that you provide, not just for your daughters, but for the entire SDA teaching and administrative staff. We are, truly, family!

Mrs. Dena Arguelles, teacher of British Lit Honors, World Literature, American Literature and AP English Literature, for being selected to attend the **2017 International Medieval Congress** held on July 3-6 at the University of Leeds in England. Drawing medievalists from over 50 countries, with over 1,900 individual papers and 630 academic sessions and a wide range of concerts, performances, readings, round tables, excursions, book fair and associated events, the Leeds International Medieval Congress is Europe's largest annual gathering in the humanities.

SDA Glee Club/Dominoes Kick Off Spring Season with Workshop Program

On Saturday, March 11, the SDA Dominoes, under the direction of Mr. Joseph Napoli hosted a three-hour Treble Choir workshop for students of All Saints Catholic Academy in Bayonne. During the workshop, the Dominoes demonstrated the vocal techniques that have led to the choir's legendary sound. The All Saints students' voices blended seamlessly with the older Dominoes. After vocalizing, the combined choirs sang, *I'm Gonna Sing When the Spirit Says Sing, Shojojee* (in Japanese), *Simple Gifts and When You Believe* (in Hebrew). The students were great; a few even performed solos and received rousing ovations from the Dominoes members after their songs. Members of the Dominoes reciprocated with solos of their own from *Les Miserables*. Chris Ann Weening, the ASCA choir's co-director told Mr. Napoli, "I have received so much positive feedback from both the parents and the students who participated in the workshop. They want to know when we're going back!"

That workshop was just the beginning of a very busy spring season for the SDA Glee Club and the Dominoes who will compete on April 19 April 23 at the *Fiesta-val Invitational Choral Festival* in Myrtle Beach. This will be the 26th consecutive spring festival for the Glee Club and Dominoes who appear in the Treble Concert Choir and Treble Chamber Choir categories.

The following week, on Friday, April 28, the Dominoes will sing at the world famous Saint Malachy's Church, *The Actor's Chapel*, in the heart of the Times Square Theater District. The Dominoes performance is part of the *National Catholic High School Choral Festival* sponsored by Pueri Cantores, the official choral organization of the Catholic Church, under whose auspices members of the Glee Club and Dominoes sang at the Vatican last New Year's Day. The mission of Pueri Cantores is to provide the opportunity for Catholic singers to work with world-class conductors and receive advanced training in sacred music and the liturgy of the Church. Choirs attending the New York festival are drawn from Catholic schools in the tri-state area. According to Mr. Napoli, "The Dominoes sang at this festival in 2014 and so this will be the second time for some of our seniors." Each choir performs three numbers and then receives a critique from guest clinician Paul French, one of America's most respected conductors of liturgical music. The Dominoes will perform Mendelssohn's *Lift Thine Eyes to the Mountains, Psalm 23 and* Randall Thompson's musical setting of the Robert Frost poem *A Girl's Garden*.

The combined participating choirs will sing an Opening Anthem, *With a Voice of Singing*, and a Closing Anthem, *Kyrie from Missa Secunda* accompanied by Saint Malachy's famous restored Aeolian Skinner pipe organ and conducted by Paul French.

Two days later, the Annual Glee Club Spring Concert will be held at 4:00 p.m. at Saint Aloysius Church with special guests, Saint Peter's Prep VOX under the direction of Emily Fencik. The two choirs will meet again on Saturday, May 13 at 7:00 p.m. for an evening of "Great Music at Saint Matthew's at Saint Matthew Lutheran Trinity Church – 57 8th Street, Hoboken.



SDA Kicks-Off Spring with "Out of Classroom" Experiences

SDA Students Explore Careers in Engineering

STEM students in both 8th and 10th grades had the opportunity to explore careers in engineering through a workshop held at TITAN Engineers PC in Union, NJ. The firm is owned by SDA alumna **Cheryl Higgins Wong '95** and her husband, Nicholas Wong, SPP '94. As part of the workshop, the girls were introduced to the various types of engineering disciplines and then had the opportunity to visit with individual engineers to learn about the projects that they were each working on. According to an 8th grader who attended the program, "I enjoyed being able to talk with the engineers and learn how they do their job, especially the women engineers! It was a really empowering experience. The presentations were well thought out."





Shakespeare *Live!*

On February 27, SDA students had the opportunity to experience a Shakespeare *Live!* performance of *Julius Caesar*. The educational touring wing of The Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey, *Shakespeare Live!* has performed for more than 600,000 students in New Jersey, New York and beyond. As a matter of fact, this is not their first time visiting SDA. According to their materials, while the texts are abridged to accommodate school schedules, *Live!* prides itself on keeping Shakespeare's language intact. Following the 65 minute performance, the cast offered a ten-minute talk back with the students. Additionally, the cast and crew of SDA's recent production of "Annie," had the opportunity to participate in a workshop in which the cast of Shakespeare *Live!* led the students in exercises they use while rehearsing and performing Shakespeare's works.







SDA Students attend the Walt Disney Youth Education Series Program in Orlando

So many wonderful new things have taken place at SDA this year, including the Academy's first ever participation in the Walt Disney World Youth Education Series (YES) program; a weeklong series of workshops for high school students held throughout the WDW theme parks. 10 students in grades 9-12 were selected to take part in this endeavor in early March. The workshops they attended included Disney Leadership Strategies and Evolution of Technology both held at EPCOT ®, and Properties of Motion Physics Lab, which took place at the **Magic Kingdom.** Each workshop was approximately three hours long after which the group had time to spend in the parks to witness, first hand, what they had learned in the individual workshops. Students who participated were freshmen Sarah Jowett, Emily Perri, Claire Roake and Valentyna Simon, sophomores Jen Marie Chie and Evi Iordamlis, juniors Jennifer Chandy, Megan Dowden, and Katie Moody and senior Isabel deLeon. Accompanying them on the trip were Mrs. Guen Farrales and Ms. Jessy Soriano. Ms. Soriano shared, "I was so impressed with the Disney Y.E.S. Program, the facilitators, and the workshops. The lessons were very hands-on and applicable to the real world. Despite being early in the morning, the facilitators kept the girls engaged, enthusiastic, and focused. The Leadership seminar was exceptionally great and really spoke to our student ambassadors. It was so refreshing to see the girls learning and having fun. On a side note, I'd like to say how proud I am of all the compliments our students received. Every Disney Y.E.S. facilitator we met with took notice of the girls' manners, kindness, and eagerness to learn."

Here's what some of the girls had to say:

I very much enjoyed my time at the WDW YES program. Of course it was fun at Disney with my friends, but the programs we participated in were better than I expected. My favorite program was the leadership program. Not only did we have great leaders, but it was such a interesting experience. I thought we would be in a classroom with others schools but we were actually in the park learning about Walt Disney. They taught us how Walt Disney was a leader and how he inspired people to continue his ideas and legacy. The best part was hearing the leadership skills from a female worker at Disney. She told us that no matter what gender you are, you can be a leader. I learned how to take someone's passion and make it my own.

Over the course of three days, I attended the Disney Youth Education Series Program in Walt Disney World. Going into the program, I was expecting that the seminars would be held in a classroom set up with power point presentations and speakers. However, I was very delighted to find out that we were escorted around both Epcot and

Magic Kingdom before the parks even opened. I gained a lot from these three seminars. Considering that I may want to do the Disney College Program, this YES Program really benefited me. The first day covered Leadership at Disney. Our tour guides explained how as a leader, you must focus on Cast Member (staff) involvement, guest experience, and finances. If the staff is happy, the guests are happy and will continue to go back to Disney. They explained it as a domino effect. We also covered Disney's four key concepts to a great guest experience. These concepts in order were Safety, Courtesy, Show, and Efficiency. If the first three concepts are followed correctly, efficiency should come automatically. On the second day, we learned about the evolution of technology. We connected math to technology and solved different equations, and talked about how technology develops such as Society, Government, Level of Technology, and Economy. On the final day, our seminar was held at Magic Kingdom instead of Epcot, and we learned about the Laws of Motion and how physics relates to the rides at Disney.
