
More New Faculty Faces

Cross Country Shoots for State Meet

The program, completing its 40th year, had a nice summer, with the girls starting their summer running program on June 26. The nucleus of last year's championship (Jersey City/South Hudson/Eastern Christian /County) team returns as the Blue Devils attempt to qualify for a second consecutive NJ State Meet of Champions berth, which would be the program's 8th. As always, the schedule will be challenging and includes a race at Disney, where the awards have an objective criteria, time. The Blue Devils were 2nd in Florida a year ago. The season began on September 15 with approximately 25 schools-many of New Jersey's best—at Lincoln Park for the 24th annual Saint Dominic Academy Invitational. He replaces the veteran staff of Marilyn and Clare Wilson, who shared their talents with the SDA girls for 14 years. The team began the Amnott era with a shutout win over Dickinson and they hope to improve on last year's record and post a winning ledger.

Danielle Prekop '19 has been named to the USA Swimming Scholastic All-American Team for 2017-2018. A swimmer must have achieved a USA Swimming Winter Junior National Time cut. Danielle qualified in the 200 breaststroke with a SCY time of 2:19.79. Additionally, the student must finish the academic year with a GPA of at least 3.5, take honors or AP classes and have no grade lower than C.

A Message from the Academic Dean

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Welcome to the 2018-2019 school year, my 10th year as a teacher and third as Academic Dean at Saint Dominic Academy. I am not exaggerating when I say that I have never been more excited to start a new school year as I am now. Yes, the challenges do seem to get tougher, but then, don't the "tough get going when the going gets rough?" As parents in this millennial age, I know that you know exactly what I am talking about. What continues to inspire me, though, are you and your daughters, and the trust and confidence that you continue to graciously place in SDA! Back-to-School Night last September 13 was evidence of such. Thank you for simply being happy with us!

On September 6, a day before school started, SDA faculty, staff and administration attended a Spirituality Day at Caldwell. Our speaker was Dr. Nancy Blattner, President of Caldwell University. Boy, did she provide that "rev on the engine" we needed for a great start...a going back to the basics of what differentiates SDA from most schools, i.e., the wonderful truth that we have a God whom we can partner with in this ministry of educating and empowering young women for leadership.

Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

In all humility, my dear parents, the above is what enables and sustains me on a daily basis. My confidence and competence stem from a personal and intimate relationship with Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior. My mantra is from Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." This is what I bring to the table. This explains why I truly love what I do and why it is my sheer joy to be of service to you and your daughters. Please do let them know that I am available to be that someone for number 5 above.
